## **Core Course XI**

#### Literary Criticism I

- b) How do you locate Horace's Ars Poetica within the framework of existing body of classical criticism? Discuss.
- c) How does Longinus understand the mechanisms of creating the "sublime" effect in literature? Explain critically.
- 2. Answer any one of the following: (250 words)
- a) Briefly explain the term 'anagnorisis' with reference to Aristotle's *Poetics*.
- b) Write a short note on the concept of 'fitting together' in Ars Poetica.
- c) Write a short note on the use of rhetorical techniques in achieving the "sublime " effect in literature.

- 3. Answer any one of the following: (750 words) 15X1=15
- a) Is the figure of the poet similar to that of a prophet in Sidney's An Apology for Poetry? Discuss.
- b) Pope's An Essay on Criticism is a Horatian compendium of maxims. Do you agree? Give textual illustrations in support of your answer.
- c) How does *Preface to Shakespeare* represent Dr. Johnson as a neoclassical critic? Elaborate.
